





Ask the Expert: Creating a Wiki/blog for your VRC

Wanna figure out how to start a blog for your collection? (What IS a blog, anyway?) Are wikis the root of all evil, or a really cool collaborative tool to use in your projects? 'Fraid to contribute to someone else's wiki, make a glaring error, and expose yourself as a luddite rube? Ask a non-threatening common-folk slide wrangler the questions your IT staff or twenty-something students laugh at you for asking....

Ask the Expert: Databases, XML and System Design

What to talk about how your database will interface with other system components like image delivery systems? Or how XML will impact how you handle data in the future? Planning a system or a new database and want to implement standards? Come chat about these or any other data or database topic of your choosing.

Ask the Expert: Digital Assets Management

Are you thinking about purchasing or using a library asset management system? Is your primary focus on the storage and retrieval of large amounts of infrequently changing media assets, such as digital video or audio media or photographic archives? Wondering about what is involved in the conversion and what these types of systems will or won't do for you?

Ask the Expert: Digital Video and Audio in the Classroom

Have the faculty you support inquired about how to use digital video and/or audio clips in the classroom? Or, perhaps, they want advice on how to incorporate digital video production as an option for the assignments they give their students. Carolyn has been supporting faculty with their digital teaching and research needs for the past 4 years. She can offer her experiences and expertise about digital video and audio from creating and editing it, to ways of sharing it on the web and in the classroom. Carolyn can also offer ideas about collaborating with other departments on campus to develop multimedia services.

Ask the Expert: Teaching Teachers ARTstor and MDID

I have conducted intensive one-on-one training sessions with faculty (art history and other disciplines) and taught group workshops as well. Adapting my training to the different learning styles of the faculty, I have enjoyed some success breaking down barriers of those who are reluctant or technology-resistant. I would be happy to share my insights and strategies with others.

Mini-Workshop 1: Dynamic Duo: Cataloging with VRA Core 4 and CCO

If you are new to Core 4.0 and CCO, or you would just like to brush up on your understanding of how these two data standards are designed to work together, this mini-workshop is for you. In the context of real cataloging issues, this workshop will address the basic decision-making that surrounds: data structure and data values; describing works and images; display values vs. index values. Participants will work through a few examples in practice cataloging situations.

Mini-Workshop 2: Metadata with Muscle; Flexing the Power of Core 4 and CCO via XML

This mini-workshop will provide a very basic introduction to XML concepts, a more in-depth look at the VRA Core 4 XML schema, and a discussion of how Core 4 and CCO are designed to work together within the XML record. Participants will be expected to have a prior working knowledge of CCO principles and the Core 4 element structure, and will help build a Core 4+CCO-compliant XML data file from the ground up by populating elements, sub-elements, and attributes with basic descriptive metadata culled from real cataloging examples.

Session 1: Fair Use / Fair Dealing; Which Should Give You More Comfort?

Many copyright scholars have often argued that the U.S. copyright exception of "fair use" is more liberal—and allows for greater flexibility—than its "fair dealing" counterpart in Canada. But after a 2004 landmark decision by the Supreme Court of Canada, some scholars have suggested that the Canadian doctrine of fair dealing actually offers the user—particularly the educational user—more latitude to make different uses of a created work (and more comfort in doing so) than does its U.S. counterpart. This session will feature two noted copyright scholars (one from Canada and one from the U.S.) to discuss the differences and give us a better understanding of the two doctrines.

Session 2: Outside the Canon

A dynamic group of speakers will discuss their work on recent and ongoing projects that often push the boundaries of traditional content areas in visual resources. Topics include; Tractors & Life on the American Front - Digitizing the Theo Brown Diaries; Creating Collections in the Arts and Humanities in an Institutional Context; Hunting for Art; On the Trail of Elusive Works; Building an Artist-centered Image Collection with Flickr; and Building a Complex Multimedia Art Database.

Session 3: New Strategies for Digital Asset Discovery

This session explores strategies for digital asset discovery. As VR professionals we now navigate nimbly between collection management systems (DAMs) and presentation tools (DAPs), but the user often suffers from a lack of information depth, as our rich collection management systems are skimmed for very shallow information to be loaded into a presentation tool. Gone, or greatly reduced, are the traditional means of discovery. What are the new strategies or possibilities? This session looks at three: the incorporation of deeper vocabularies, user-side tagging, and technical image metadata.

Session 4: Engaging New Technologies, Part I

This fast-paced session will demonstrate a rich variety of new technologies, and show how to engage with a heady array of contemporary products, services and tools. Organized as two distinct but complementary 90 minute sections, this session will present overviews (5-10 minutes each) of at least 10 tools, providing for each a sample of an "end product" use, an overview of the software itself (demystifying the process involved in using it), followed by an open opportunity to brainstorm about how each tool or technology can be applied (matched) to our own work to support instruction, communication and research. Session 5: Roundtable on Issues in Visual Resources Administration

This roundtable will bring together visual resources professionals from a cross-section of institutions to discuss a variety of topics in visual resources management, and offer insight into the effective administration of image collections in the digital age. The Roundtable will focus on budgeting, staffing, space/facilities needs, and cross-institutional collaborations; cataloging, metadata, and digital imaging per se will not be considered except in relation to the more general topics of budgeting, staffing, and other administrative issues.

Session 6: Bricks to Bamboo; Cataloging and Photographing the Materials Library

A Materials Library is often an important component of the curriculum in the teaching of architecture, structural engineering, and the built environment. Cataloging, capturing, and displaying such a collection of materials, examples, and product samples presents formidable challenges. This session will include several presentations by architecture curators with experience in managing or developing Materials Libraries in academic settings. The cataloging of unusual materials will be addressed, along with conceptual and practical issues.

Session 7: Metadata in Action; Leveraging Assets with Core4 and CCO

This session will focus on how specific collections have implemented the Core4 and CCO data standards. Presenters will talk about the challenges involved in promoting the use of standards in collaborative projects (technical, administrative and social); address issues and considerations surrounding the preparation of data for export and dissemination via various delivery platforms; and show how the use of data standards promotes and enhances access to collections, and facilitates cross-collection and cross-disciplinary discovery.

Session 8: SAHARA at Launch Time

The SAHARA (SAH Architecture Resources Archive) project is scheduled to launch on April 1, 2009, with approximately 10,000 images and 100 QTVRs, as well as an upload toolkit for individual submissions to SAHARA by scholars. This session provides a pre-launch demonstration of SAHARA, along with the tools, so that the visual resources community can see the directions in which the project is moving. We will also update attendees about the next steps for the second and third years of SAHARA, and facilitate a discussion about participation.

Session 9: Training Millennials at Work: Strategies for Training a New Generation

Millennials (student workers and temporary employees born between 1980 and 2000) have become increasingly important human resources in visual resource collections. As this demographic plays an increasingly more significant role in our daily operations, how do we effectively teach and train Millennials? This session focuses on strategies for educating and communicating essential aspects and concepts of the VR profession to individuals immersed in the Web 2.0 culture. Panelists will cover multiple topics and points of view, including: the hiring process and conducting meaningful interviews; metadata and cataloging practices; production, digitization and image quality control; and effective communication with Millennial employees. The session will be enhanced by examples of new tools and innovative ways to conduct outreach and motivate employees.

Special Interest Group: Architecture Curators

VRA members who work in VR collections in an architectural department, firm, or archive will meet to discuss issues of interest to the built environment, including landscape architecture, urban planning, and construction management. The Architecture curators SIG has a listserve of 42 members who would like to meet one another face-to-face, and to encourage other interested curators to participate.

Special Interest Group: Cataloging

This is an open forum that will be "all about cataloging". It will be audience-driven and interactive, but moderated.

Special Interest Group: Getty Vocabularies; CONA and Multilinguality: Update on the Getty Vocabularies

This SIG will present a discussion and presentation which will focus on a variety of new projects in development in the Getty Vocabulary Program. Topics will include: the structure and implementation of the newest vocabulary, the Cultural Objects Name Authority (CONA), progress on the multilinguality of AAT with the addition of thousands of Spanish and Italian terms, extensive contributions to ULAN from the Witt Library at the Courtauld Institute of Art and the Avery Index, and the upcoming addition of 5 million place names into TGN, from the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency (formerly NIMA). Plus, there will be updates on individual contributions, making the Getty Vocabularies available in APIs, as well as newly published works by Patricia Harpring and Murtha Baca.

Special Interest Group: Museum Visual Resources

The Museum Visual Resource Special Interest Group provides an opportunity for museum professionals to gather and to discuss issues that are particular to museums. The focus of the discussions will revolve around the changing roles of the museum visual resources professional. The specific roles played in the creation, cataloging and management of digital images as well as any involvement in the museum's Digital Asset Management system will also be addressed.

ARTstor contains over 900,000 images of art, architecture, and archaeology from a wide range of cultures and time periods. ARTstor representatives will give brief presentations on topics such as collections news, technology enhancements, the ARTstor Hosting Program, and progress on interoperation efforts. A Q&A session will follow; conference participants are encouraged to submit questions in advance to the session moderator.

Special Users Group: EmbARK

EmbARK is a suite of software tools designed to catalog and manage collections. Cataloguer provides the user to input metadata for digital images, manages thumbnails, provides import and export tools to easily migrate data in or out of the Cataloguer. Records can be grouped into portfolios or managed as a whole. Comprehensive searching options are available. There will be time for discussion of version 7 including the new feature of drag and drop. Time will be allotted for questions and comments.

Special Users Group: MDID

The Madison Digital Image Database (MDID) is a freely distributed, open source web application developed at James Madison University to facilitate teaching with digital media online and in the classroom. This session will bring MDID developers, users and potential users together to share their experiences and to ask questions. Members of the MDID development team will talk about ongoing development, present a preview of the upcoming MDID 3 release, and give an

update on the API development, which is supported by an IMLS grant. Following the formal presentation there will be an "Ask the Experts" session. Attendees will be able to ask questions about MDID, make suggestions for further development, or receive technical and curatorial help specific to the use of MDID at their institution. Because MDID does not generate revenue, it is not possible for James Madison University to provide in-depth technical support to other institutions. Therefore this event provides a unique venue for sharing information within the MDID community.

Special Users Group: IRIS

The 2008 version of IRIS (Image Resource Information System) will be demonstrated and discussed. This "final" version of the FileMaker application implements the VRA Core v.4.0 and CCO and includes an XML export. IRIS, begun in 1997 as a cooperative venture of 7 institutions, now has 25 member institutions. Anyone is welcome to attend this meeting; you do not need to be an IRIS user to learn from or contribute to the discussion.

Special Users Group: VCat

VCat (renamed from VireoCat) is a Filemaker-based database that is VRA Core 4 and CCO compliant. It is capable of outputting both flattened Excel and Core 4 validating XML. The database is free and downloadable from the user group website: https://sites.google.com/site/vcatusers/. All are welcome to attend; there will be a short presentation about VCat and related data sharing issues and then discussion among the users.

Workshop 1: Issues in VR Administration

This workshop is designed to introduce new visual resources curators and librarians to various topics in visual resources management and offer them guidance in the effective daily administration of a visual resources operation and facility in the digital age. This four-hour workshop will focus on administrative procedures (budgeting, policies, reports, workflows), collection development and acquisitions (in-house, purchased, licensed), human resources (staffing, changes in job descriptions, professional development), strategic planning for a digital transition, cross-institutional collaboration, training, reference, and project management. Since there are typically other conference opportunities that address issues of digital imaging, cataloging/metadata, and database design, this workshop will not cover those topics. There will be ample time for questions and discussion.

Workshop 2: Selling Visual Resources: Educating and Engaging the Educators

As more educators immerse themselves in digital technology and new images/tools become available from a variety of online resources, faculty and students in and outside of the arts are incorporating images into their teaching and research. These image users range from spontaneous do-it-yourselfers to those who prefer to have it done for them by centrally provided image services. But what about the users who fall somewhere in between, who might make better decisions about image options if they first consult with professionals? With fewer patrons walking in the door, visual resources curators need to reconsider how to reach and interact with image users, as well as how to provide the best services to accommodate pedagogical needs. This workshop will explore several techniques for reaching and teaching faculty who use, or want to use, images in the classroom. Workshop leaders will present practical methods for reaching faculty through a variety of marketing and outreach techniques including (but not limited to): video promos, posters, brochures, blogs/wikis, and online tutorials. Participants will have hands-on time to begin creating a marketing plan and opportunities to experiment with the various technologies required to create outreach materials. Additional presentations, interactive problem-solving, and discussions will focus on employing sound principles of adult learning, and developing strategies for facilitating faculty use of digital images and the services provided by visual resources collections. A handbook will provide summaries of central issues, practical guides, and references to current research and associated information.

Workshop 3: Photoshop for Artworks; Cool Tools & Techniques for Enhancing Images of Paintings, Sculpture, Prints & Drawings

How can one enhance images of artworks, even those poorly photographed? This eyes-on workshop will cover tips and techniques for improving and correcting images of paintings, prints, drawings, and other two-dimensional art forms, as well as architecture and sculpture. Participants will also learn about embedded metadata and rights information.


